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## <u>Criteria and page types for creating your Xerte object on East meets</u> <u>West</u>

## Permitted page types (from which you can choose)

Here is a list of the different page templates that we recommend you use within Xerte. Misc - Google Map	MEDIA or INTERACTIVE

## Criteria (numbers and kinds of page types you should include)

Note, the following table offers **guidance** about what you include in your Xerte object – as a group you can decide to get creative and vary the information that you present and how you present it or to use page templates in different ways to those we have suggested below (e.g. to use a MEDIA page to present a primary source like an image).

We advise you to include the following elements in your Xerte object (use the following table to tick the elements that you have included when you come to create your object).

CRITERIA	NOTES	Yes/No (you should be able to answer 'yes' to all of these questions)
Is the object between 8 and 10 pages long?	These are the minimum criteria for completion of the assignment (like the word count in an essay).	
Have you included a TITLE page?	This should include the title of your object. You can use a page template other than the TITLE, but it must contain the basic information about your Xerte object.	



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Have you included at least 2	These should be positioned at the	
ORIENTATION pages?	beginning and end of your object so	
	that your audience know what you	
	are trying to do with the Xerte object (think about it like the introduction	
	and conclusion to an essay). As with	
	the TITLE page, you can use other	
	page templates to fulfil the task of	
	orienting your audience but you	
	must make sure that you accomplish	
	this task.	
Have you included at least 3 DATA	Think about using the 'hyperlinks' or	
pages (at least 1 should deal with	page to provide your audience with	
secondary sources and 2 with	access to further information. Make	
primary sources)?	sure that you cover BOTH primary	
	and secondary sources.	
	IMPORTANT (for assessment of	
	knowledge and understanding, in	
	particular):	
	<b>Primary source pages</b> should	
	include: (a) a short extract from the	
	source (50-200) words; (b) an	
	explanation of the meaning of that source and why it is important; (c)	
	another quotation from the source,	
	or an alternative source that is	
	related in some way (e.g. in terms of	
	theme, place or person). Don't forget	
	to provide a reference to the	
	source/s that you cite; (d) see the	
	'Working on primary sources' document on Blackboard for more	
	guidance on this; (e) you should	
	think about using primary sources of	
	different types: images of artefacts	
	and monuments can be primary	
	source and so can poems and works	
	of literature (don't just restrict	
	yourselves to narratives and sources	
	that seem to offer historical 'facts') – in this case you might want to use a	
	MEDIA page to show your primary	
	source(s).	
	<b>Secondary source pages</b> should be	
	related to the primary source in	



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	some way. You should explain how the secondary scholar has used the primary source and/or how their work helps to contextualise the primary source.  Referencing: Don't forget to include a FULL bibliographic reference to the sources you have used.	
Have you included at least 1 MEDIA page?	This is intended to get you thinking about how you would engage your audience through the use of multimedia such as videos, images and maps.	
	You might want to use a MEDIA page to present a primary source (e.g. a poem being read aloud) or a secondary source (e.g. a historian talking on YouTube). The key thing is to be creative and show that you've thought about how to present the source, its strengths and weaknesses as evidence, and how it relates to the other slides on your Xerte object.	
Have you included at least 1 INTERACTIVE page?	One of the aims of your object will be to teach your audience about your subject and a good way to do this is to ask them to do an activity to test what they have learnt. You need to think here about what you said in the orientation page about what you wanted to show them. Devise questions that will allow them to think about their learning.	
Have you included the names of the members of your group?	Do this on the final slide (or you may insert an additional slide if you do not have room).
